Take A52 to RADBOURNE LANE, sp. RADBOURNE, continue past estate and take L Fork sp. DALBURY and go to crossroads and L. sp. LTVALL.

R. at main road and in village fork L. sp. VILLINGTON and go on to crossroads. L. at crossroads. sp. WILLINGTON and continue into village. At crossroads in village to straight over onto B5132 and follow to SWARKSTONE. R.onto A514, through STANTON-BY-BRIDGE and fork L. onto minor

STANDARD RIDES. continued.

road, sp. KINGS NEWTON and follow on to ISLEY WALTON. At A453 R. turn sp. TONGE and take next L. joining A447. Follow this r ad to B5324. Here R. sp. COLECTION and go over B587 junction and take next L. sp. SINOPE. Follow lane across A512 to A50.

R. here and first L. sp. RAVENSTONE, (by parking sign). At crossroads in village turn R. sp HEATHER and follow to this village. In HEATHER R. onto main street and take next R. sp. MEASHAM and follow through to MEASHAM. At T Junction L., down hill to new traffic lights where R. turn, sp. Burton.

At A444 turn R. and then take second L. sp. LULLINGTON. Fork R. and take next L. sp LULLINGTON. At next junction L. sp. COTON, and go to this village. Here L. at Queens Head sp. Walton, and then R. into Church Street and on to WALTON.

Straight over at crossroads and on to BARTON. Through this village and at White Pub (Bell Inn) turn R. sp NEEDWOOD. Take next L. sp. NEWCHURCH and at crossroads L. sp HADLEY END. Follow this lane over A515 to five lanes junction. At junction take second R. sp ABEOTS BROILEY continue along lane taking sharp L. sp. MORREY. Lunch at first house on the R.

AFTERNOON COURSE.

Continue down lane and take first R. and on to T. junction.. Here R. sp.HAMSTALL RIDWARE and continue to this village and fork R. and past church. At next crossroads go straight over and follow lane forking R. to COLTON and continue to B5031. Turn R. and follow B5031 to second L. turn, sp NEWTON. On to NEWTON and fork L. sp. DROINTON. At DROINTON fork R. sp STOTE. and go through this village to A518. L. turn and take the next R. sp GAYTON turn R. off this lane into GAYTON, sp. MILLWICH and continue on to B5027. L. here and into MILLWICH village.

R. turn here sp. FARSHALL GREEN and continue to T Junction. R. here sp MORRILOW HEATH. Fork first L. and take two

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STANDARD RIDES. continued.

L. forks and drop down to level crossing at UPFER LEIGH. Up hill from level crossing fork L twice sp. TEAN to A50. L. here to UFFER TEAN and R. onto B522 sp. CHEADLE. Follow to CHEADLE, and here R. turn onto B5417 and follow to CAKAMOUR.

Take first R. over river, sp. FARLEY and follow to T. junction. R. here and go over crossroads to FLLASTONE. Take next R. sp. DENSTONE, and go down to B5032 at ELLASTONE. At B road R. and first L. sp..NORBURY, over river and R. turn to ROSTON. Follow lane and signs for THURVASTON and onto Long Lane. Follow Long Lane over A515, through GREAT CUELEY and ALKECMICH to finish at the outskirts of DERBY.

The club's 2 up Time Trial was organised this year by Richard House. As usual there were some very fast times recorded. Unfortunately it was a thundery evening which washed a lot of grit on the road causing many punctures. Our only full club team was John Cooper and Dermot Stuart who got under the hour, in 59 mins-48secs. Tony Marlow and John Beavan rode as a composite team to record 59min-27secs. Kevin Powley and Liz. Price recorded 1hr-6mins-42secs.

The winners were P.Wells and P.Bennett from the Edgeware R.C. in 53mins-39secs.

The following Sunday the club helped again with the marshalling and feeding of the B.D.C.A. 100. Many thanks Derothy and Nerris Wigley for providing the refreshments, Brian Langham and Vic Sewell for helping marshal and all the others too numerous to mention. We had five riders enter but only two finished. Ted Forbes, Ken Goy, John Cooper all retired. I know Ted was really in trouble he's not the sort of rider to retire unless it is something serious. Congratulations to Wilf Lawson on recording a personal best in 4hrs-25mina-36secs. Tony Marlow recorded 4hrs-44mins-08secs but he wasn't too pleased with the time, like myself he has been suffering from a chest complaint. Second claim member Les Lowe timed

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4hrs-58mins-35secs. The winner was Mark Vowells from the San Fairy Ann C.C. from Kent in 4hrs-5min-16secs.

The previous day some of us lesser riders not wanting to ride 100 miles, like myself, rode in the Matlock C.C. event over 25 miles at Etwall. Dermot Stuart was our fastest rider in 1hr-Amins-19secs, Dave Bousfield timed 1hr-7mins-44 secs, and I did 1hr-14mins-41 secs. The winner was S.Burney in 58mins-06secs.

The following Wednesday evening, four of us entered the B.D.C.A. 25 mile TT at Loughborough, it was a wet evening but times were fairly reasonable. Wilf Lawson timed thr-2mins-12secs, Ted Forbes thr-21mins-05secs and yours truly thr-15mins-14secs, Dave Bousfield was unfortunately a non-starter dué to work commitments. The winner was Geoff Platt from Coalville Wheelers in 58mins-15secs.

The week after this I spent with my family on the Gower Feninsula in South Wales, a poor week weather wise, likewise for the riders in the Isle of Man. Ken Goy travelled over with Dave Grimes, Colin Farmer and Owen Jowett from the ACE and Kevin Powley from Derwent Velo. I have only reports onthe two major time trials, the 1 lap of the TT Circuit 37½ miles and the 25 mile TT.

Kevin finished 8th in the mountain event, wan by that unbeatable rider Dave Lloyd who just failed to treak course record, Ken finished about 2/3rd down the field. The 25 mile event saw Hevin again finish 8th in 1hr-1min-18secs and Ken in the 1st 30 riders in 1hr-5mins. From what I remember when I went over there it is a fairly hilly 25 mile TT.

At fairly short notice I was asked to help time the Brereton wheelers 25 mile event at Stone. Wilf Lawson was again consistent with a time of thr-2min-14secs, Dave Bousfield timed thr-7min-17secs, Les Lowe thr+0min-25secs and Kevin Powley who again finished 8th in 50mins-42secs a personal best. The winner was Steve Hudson from Coventry R.C. in 56mins-08secs.

I have received reports of some excellent times being

done by two of our younger riders in club 25's on the 438. Hark Sheffield has recorded thr-6mins and thr-4mins. Steve Merriman has recorded thr-13mins and thr-10mins. Meep it up lads.

Wilf Lawson just failed to get under the hour in one of the events.

Ted Forbes informed me the other evening in a local hostelry which he frequents, that he won age standard prize in the Ercreton wheelers 10 mile event, well done Ted.

The numbers at the evening 10 mile events have fallen off a bit just lately due to poor weather of late but the trio who usually go out on C.T.C. runs namely Dave Cilbert, Dave Lambert and Chris Wells are regulars plus Elizabeth Price and Dave Peters. Competition for the senior award is fairly close between Wilf Lawson and John Cooper.

Young Andrew Walton continues to improve in club time trials, he is now feeling the benefit of some track racing with the Concord R.C.C. at Salford Park.

To close the racing scene congratulations to Wilf Lawson in recording 2hrs-7mins in the National 50, again a personal best.

Members may like to know we are selling off the sponsored jerseys at £5 each. No doubt you know that Trevor Jarvis has had to close down Burton Engineering. I hope Trevor continues to do well with his cycle business to make up for it.

When these notes appear the roller racing at Burton regatta should have taken place. I hope it goes off well.

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WINGED WHEELS. Continued from July Awheel.

In 1883 the name was changed to the Cyclists Touring Club and the fortunes and membership have always fluctuated In 1896 membership was 60,499 the highest ever. In 1918 membership fell to 8,546 the lowest since 1883. Diamond Jubilee year of 1938 membership was 37,000 and in 1941 it had fallen to 23,703. Another peak was 1950 when membership stood at 53,574 now it stands at about 28,000. Early offices were in Newcastle on Tyne, Bradford and Fleet Street in London, then followed 3 Craven Hill and now Godalming.

In 1898 Libus Internationale Des Associations fouristes (LIAT) was formed in Luxembourg. In 1894 the Northumberland and Durham District Association was formed, this was almost defunct during the 1914-18 war. In 1899 no less than 14 District Associations were in being and six more were formed before 1918. Derby District Association was formed in 1924 and Burton Section was reformed in 1941. I wander what year Derby and Alfreton sections were formed?.

Monochrome slide lectures were held in Liverpool in 1897 by famous cycling personalties. In 1902 commuted membership was introduced in periods of 5 and 10 years. In 1910 King George V became patron of the Cyclists Touring Club and in 1913 the Prince Of Wales, later King Ldward V111 and later still Duke of Windsor became a life member.

In 1918 the Alliance Internationale de Tourisme (AIT) was formed. The Touring Club de France invited the C.T.C. and others to form it. In 1935 the Cycle Touring Commission of the A.I.T. was formed by the C.T.C. and Ligue Velocipedique Belge.

In 1957 the cycling clubs of France, Belgium, Switzerland and Italy combined to form Confederation Internationale de Cyclotourisme, the C.T.C. joined by invitation. In 1947 the first A.I.T. Rally was organised by Ligue Velocipedique Belge in the Ardennes district of Belgium. The second A.I.T. Rally was held at York in conjunction with the Rally in 1948.

In 1921 the Cyclists War Memorial was unveiled at Meriden by Lord Birkenhead on 21st May, 10,000 cyclists attended. After the first world war the club's fortunes revived, mainly by returning troops seeking now adventures. Pass storming became popular especially in Wales, Scotland and the Lake District, also abroad. Maps were studied for old miners paths and Drove Roads. (nothing new is there !.)

In 1928 the first foreign tour was led by Nevill Whall the assistant Secretary, to France. When restrictions on travel were lifted after the second world war in 1949, R.Shaw the Secretary lead a Swedish tour of 20 cyclists, no less than 300 cyclists applied to join it!. In 1924 at the Olympia cycle show the first C.T.C. diary was on sale. 1925 free third party insurance was introduced. 1934 the Defence Fund was established. In 1938 it was proposed to introduce cycle training in schools. In recent times 1952 the first B.C.T.C. competition was held with the final in Shrewsbury, in 1976 it became a two day final.

In 1950, on December 28th the Peak District National Park was formed, the first in Britain. January 1951 Lake District National Park was formed. February 1951 North Wales National Park formed.

In 1955 on May 8th the first cyclist special rail trip was held. On September 23rd 1956, 350 London cyclists came to Burton on a Cyclists Special at a fare of £1. Mine itineraries were available, and I led one of them into the Churnet Valley area. A later Cyclists Special was from Coventry to Matlock, and again I led a party to Monsal Head with tea at Over Haddon.

In 1930 the Youth Hostels Association was formed in Britain, bed night fees were only 1chining!.

In 1958 no less than 3,000 tickets were supplied by the C.T.C. for members going on foreign tours. They did not sell me one, my first foreign tour was 1959.

1966 October 1st Cotterell House was opened at Goda'ming.

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1970 The first Birthday Rides were held, based at Godal-

ming.

Throughout the book, persons and administrators have sought to impose restrictions on the cyclist and this club of ours has always fought hard for our rights on the public highway. This is one good reason to pay our subscriptions promptly.

Finally I received today the February copy of Cycle Touring and it reveals that membership is at 35,000 and I see that "Winged Wheels" is still available at only £2.30p, excellent value !.

With reference to a query in the above article - Alfreton Section was formed in 1929.

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TO LARIDEN.

It was the generous and thoughtful offer of a lift which took me in that direction. Since my one and only visit to the service in the mid 1920's. So with Freddie on the roof-rack plus a sidecar and a very young cyclist for company we soon arrived at the scene of action.

Levery fine morning it was and a good number of cyclists to attend, though there was plenty of room for another few hundreds. I remember my previous trip to heriden

I got nowhere near the service, the green was packed solid.

So the service over we retired to the village hall for refreshment. The sun shone down on a lawn full of cyclists who were busy packing the calories. That sight took me back a few years to when the catering for a large club would be mot by a very large tea-urn.

An hour or so later I started my return cycle ride to Eurton by Maxstoke, Shustoke Green where I came across a small party of cyclists, one was suffering from the wind, (lack of same in inner tube). They caught me up later and I rode with Fred, the old man of the erew. Across by Bodymoor Heath and to Fazeley, a district I do not often patronise. Fred and his crew were talking of stopping in Tamworahd then by Wiggington and the lanes to Lullington. So I let them carry on and took the main road to Elford and back by Catton Park.

The ride back was by unfamiliar roads, quite enjoyable except for the Maxst-ke area where I remember evening rides when years ago I worked in the Coventry area.
